We welcome back our dear friend, international coloratura soprano, Alexandra Flood alongside American Baritone Alexander York, who will also be making his debut at the festival this August.

The Orava Quartet returns for their 3-year residency with the Bangalow Music Festival and SXS Artist in Residence didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams, violinist/dancer Eric Avery and actor/writer Paula Narzarski join us for the **World Premiere** of *Maps and Journeys* to explore our First Nation's 65000 years of astronomical traditions.

Zentveld's Coffee Concert returns to their lush coffee plantation in Newrybar for a beautiful Friday morning concert with gourmet coffee and fascinating conversation, and we extend the music into the main street of Bangalow this year with three short BMF Bitesize events on Saturday 13 August. Two of these will be held at the gorgeous Ninbella Gallery featuring the artists of Maps and Journeys and the other will feature SXS viola superstar, James Wannan in a late-night Bach by Candlelight, held in Bangalow's picturesque Uniting Church.

We hope that you can join us in the gorgeous township of Bangalow this August to savour the best experiences life offers: beautiful music, stunning scenery, fine food, wonderful friends and the chance to unwind and sit back for a few relaxing days of 'joie de vivre'.

Performing with Australian and international artists and providing meaningful community outreach to regional NSW, Southern Cross Soloists are Tania Frazer (Artistic Director, Oboe), Alan Smith (Violin), Ashley Smith (Clarinet), Jonathan Henderson (Flute), Nick Mooney (French Horn) and James Wannan (Viola) as well as Composer-in-Residence: John Rotar and Chris Williams Didgeridoo Artist in Residence. SXS curate and deliver a national performance program whilst continuing to nurture and develop emerging chamber music talent and provide meaningful engagement in regional communities. SXS provides opportunities for emerging artists through its flagship SXS Next Gen Artists Program, nurturing eight early career professional musicians each year.

ASTRONOMERS explores the rich astronomical traditions of Australia's First Nations' people over the past 65,000 years, believed to be the oldest practice of astronomy in the world. This celestial knowledge and deep understanding of the land has been aurally passed down from generation to generation through sophisticated systems, stories and Songlines, marking the continuity and intricacy of the oldest culture in the world. The *Maps and Journeys* program presents new works by First Nations' composers Brenda Gifford and Eric Avery, and also Sean O'Boyle AM in a concert of Australian works inspired by the night sky and the Seven Sister constellation. Also collaborating with SXS to create and perform this program are actor/writer Paula Nazarski, composer Sean O'Boyle AM and SXS Artist in Residence didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams.

Romance, chivalry and midnight madness feature in this 'high drama' program of illustrious, but misplaced, gallantry and heroism.

Virtuoso coloratura soprano, Alexandra Flood promises to thrill with her extraordinary vocal techniques in two iconic Donizetti arias. Opening with Norina's aria from comic opera, *Don Pasquale*, which pokes fun at an unsuspecting gallant knight that Norina has used her expert charms on, Alexandra will also perform the most challenging of all coloratura arias, Lucia's Mad Scene from *Lucia di Lammermoor*.

SXS will perform Mozart's witty *Kegelstatt Trio* (named after Mozart's favourite game of skittles) for clarinet, viola and piano.

The second half of the program explores the 17th century tale of Don Quixote: *The Ingenious Nobleman Mister Quixote of La Mancha*. American Baritone, Alexander York takes on the role of Don Quixote, in works inspired by this enigmatic tale by Ravel, Strauss, Ibert, De Falla and Leigh/Darion's *Man of La Mancha*.

The Bangalow Music Festival's Quartet in Residence, the Orava Quartet returns to the A&I Hall stage with an intriguing program of energetic and stunningly beautiful music.

Traditional folk music from Scandinavia opens the program, with a set of exquisite pieces from *Wood Works*, arranged by the Danish String Quartet. *Nordic folk music reimagined*, these beautiful classical/folk hybrid works express an effortless *joie de vivre* through their stunning interpretations of folk melodies handed down through the generations. Artistic Director and oboist, Tania Frazer joins the quartet for the *World Premiere* of

a new work by acclaimed Australian composer, Sean O'Boyle AM. Bursting with energy, Pavel Fisher's *Mad Piper* String Quartet closes the first half of the concert, with its joyous vitality, spirited rhythmic drive and Eastern European folk music influence.

Australian piano sensation, Simon Tedeschi joins the Orava Quartet after interval to perform Brahms' torridly emotional Piano Quintet in F minor. Evolving out of a string quintet and piano duo, Brahms' celebrated Quintet is recognized as a supreme masterpiece and one of the best-loved works in the entire chamber music canon.

Heralded as a "First-magnitude star in the making" by the Seattle Times, British violinist Emma McGrath made her London debut aged 10 in the Purcell Room, and at 14 she performed Bruch's Violin Concerto No. 1 in the Queen Elizabeth Hall with the London Philharmonic Orchestra. The multi-instrumentalist commenced her training on the piano at the Northern Rivers Conservatorium when she was 8 years old and since then has excelled as a composer, appearing in the internationally acclaimed 'Tilly's Symphony'; composing for the Australian Chamber Orchestra and the Cinema Touching Disability Film Festival in Austin, Texas; and performing with the renowned James Morrison, Richard Gill, Sean O'Boyle AM and Jane Rutter. Frequently working with the Lismore community, Tilly composed music for the 25th Anniversary of the Lismore Lantern Parade, and has collaborated with local artists such as Mykaela Jay and RealArtWorks. 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
